Discussion Questions

These questions are provided to further your application of Sunday's message and to prepare you for PCC's small group discussions.

- 1. Our passage this week focuses on the presence and quality of an individual's love for God. It seems self-evident that our ultimate and highest form of love is appropriate for the supreme Person in the universe. It is with this kind of love that most of us have little experience. We most often find ourselves dabbling in some inferior feeling and expression of love. Consider for a moment the *highest* quality love that we humans are capable of possessing and expressing. What is that love like? Describe it as best you can.
- 2. Our verses lead us to apply tests to our "love for God" to see just how genuine it really is. Before the tests are applied, our passage begins with a familiar statement: "I love God". Assuming that at the outset of your study in this text you would be inclined to say the same, how would you describe this love? Generally speaking, what do you think is the quality of your love for God?

How would you rate it from 1 to 10? (10 = the best a human is capable of; 1 = barely even considered love.)

Why didn't you rate this a number or two higher?

3. The first test that reveals the quality of our love for God is the love we have (or don't have) for our spiritual brothers and sisters. How are you doing in this area? Are there some spiritual siblings that are challenging to love at this point in your life?

While pondering this area of your life, what did this reveal about your love for God—especially in light of how much God loves the Christians that you don't get along with too well?

How do you plan on improving your love for other Christians?

4. The second test urges us to evaluate our relationship with God's commands. Assuming that you have some regular intake from God's word, how do you feel about the many commands that you read in the Bible? How "burdensome" are they for you? Which are the most burdensome?

While pondering this area of your life, what does this reveal about your love for God—especially in light of these commands simply reflecting the nature and character of God Himself?

How do you plan on improving your quest for personal holiness?

5. The final test in our passage leads us to consider our relationship with truth. This is not just the directives in the Bible that relate to our behavior but all sorts of facts that declare the truth of God. How is your relationship with truth of God's word? How attractive is the Bible to you at this point in your life?
