

These questions are provided for your further study and application of today's message. Thoughtfully writing out the answers to these questions will help to drive home the point of today's message. It is also helpful to discuss your answers with others. This can take place with friends, your family, accountability partners, or ministry groups within the church.

1. Who do you know who is ambivalent about the importance or trustworthiness of the Bible?

Read 2 Peter 1:21 and 2 Timothy 3:16. Why do such emphatic claims reduce the ability of the rational person to be neutral toward the Bible? In other words, why do verses like these compel us to make a firm decision one way or the other about this book?

- 2. How would you respond to someone who says that the Bible cannot be trusted because its message has been distorted through centuries of retelling, rewriting, revising and retranslating its content over and over again?
- 3. Read the following truncated list of Old Testament prophecies and New Testament fulfillments. How do these verses help to bolster your confidence that the Bible was coauthored by an omniscient God?
