## Prompted by Love A Lifelong Quest



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1. Keep	(v.8)	1 Cor. 13:8-13  8 Love never fails. But where there are prophecies, they will cease; where there are tongues, they wil be stilled; where there is knowledge, it will pass away.

Keep	(vv.9-12)	9 For we know in part and we prophesy in part, 10 but when perfection comes, the imperfect disappears 11 When I was a child I talked like a child, I thought like a child, I reasoned like a child When I became a man, I put childish ways behind me. 12 Now we see but a poor reflection as in a mirror; then we shall see face to face. Now I know in part; then I shall know fully, even as I am fully known. 13 And now these three remain: faith, hope and love. But the greatest of these is love. (MIV)

## Application Questions

These questions are provided for your further study and application of today's message. Thoughtfully writing out the answers to these questions will help to drive home the point of today's message. Why is it difficult to shift the assessment of yourself from what you do to why you do it?

2. How does the temporal nature of your "roles" and "giftedness" encourage you?

Is there some sense in which pondering the temporal nature of your "roles" and "giftedness" discourages you? What does that reveal?

- 3. Imagining your life from the vantage point of "one million years from now" can help you keep God's priorities your top priorities. What practical device or habitual practice can vou employ to keep your focus on eternity?
- 4. List the names of three people (who are not a part of your biological family) toward whom you intend to cultivate and express a more Christlike and humble love. What steps will you take to fulfill this commitment?
