Application Questions

These questions are provided for your further study and application of today's sermon. Thoughtfully writing out the answers to these questions will help to drive home the point of today's study. It is also helpful when you are able to discuss your answers with others.

- 1. As noted earlier in this series when we looked at Christ's correctives for common misapplications of Scripture (Mt.5:17-48), many had used the biblical principles of justice which applied in the courtroom to justify their own vindictive retaliation in personal settings. How does this kind of thinking still happen today? In other words, how do Christians sometimes justify spiteful and retaliatory (i.e., evil) responses when they are mistreated?
- 2. Read **Psalm 9:7-10**. How does faith in God (or a lack thereof) impact a Christian's ability to respond graciously and magnanimously when they are mistreated?
- 3. Read 1 Timothy 3:7. Why should we care what non-Christians think of us?
- 4. Read **Proverbs 14:29**. What specific counsel would you give a Christian who says he usually responds guickly and without thinking when he is wronged?
- 5. What practical steps can you take to ensure that you slow down, so that you can respond strategically the next time you are treated unjustly?
