Application Questions

These questions are provided for your further study and application of today's sermon. Thoughtfully writing out the answers to these questions will help to drive home the point of today's study. It is also helpful when you are able to discuss your answers with others.

- 1. Write down some of the names of the Christians in your church who have been an encouragement to you recently, especially in any of the four ways identified from Romans 16 in the first part of this sermon.
- 2. Read 1 Corinthians 16:10-12, 15-18. As we saw in Romans 16, Paul will often take time in his epistles to identify by name people who need to be recognized and honored. List Paul's reasons in these verses for lauding Timothy, Stephanas' household, Stephanas, Fortunatus and Achaicus. Do any other Christians in your church come to mind when you write out these descriptions?
- 3. Of the six ways identified in Romans 16 to encourage those who encourage you, which is the most neglected in your practice? Why do you think you tend to overlook this means of encouraging your encouragers?
- 4. Read Matthew 13:53-57. It is often those closest to us or most familiar to us whom we fail to appreciate. How

can you prevent yourself from taking for granted the "familiar encouragers" in your life? What periodic reminders can you employ?

5. In light of the six identified ways to encourage your encouragers, which ones will you utilize this week, and toward whom?
