2. Ecclesiastes A. Author **Ecclesiastes 1:16** I said in my heart, "I have acquired great wisdom, surpassing all who were over Jerusalem before me, and my heart has had great experience of wisdom and knowledge."































5. Introduction to the Prophets A. The Role "Prophet" = "Mouthpiece" of God's Message • cp. the "Priest" People \rightarrow (priest) \rightarrow God God \rightarrow (prophet) \rightarrow People **B. Forth-Telling vs. Foretelling** Authenticating Credentials

Isaiah 46:9–10 remember the former things of old; for I am God, and there is no other; I am God, and there is none like me, declaring the end from the beginning and from ancient times things not yet done, saying, 'My counsel shall stand, and I will accomplish all my purpose,'



Deuteronomy 18:21–22 And if you say in your heart, 'How may we know the word that the LORD has not spoken?'— when a prophet speaks in the name of the LORD, if the word does not come to pass or come true, that is a word that the LORD has not spoken; the prophet has spoken it presumptuously. You need not be afraid of him.



5. Introduction to the Prophets **C.** Test of the Prophets 1) Says He Speaks for God Deuteronomy 18:18–19 And I will put my words in his mouth, and he shall speak to them all that I command him. And whoever will not listen to my words that he shall speak in my name, I myself will require it of him.



5. Introduction to the Prophets **C.** Test of the Prophets 2) 100% Accurate Predictive Prophecies **Deuteronomy 18:20** But the prophet who presumes to speak a word in my name that I have not commanded him to speak, or who speaks in the name of other gods, that same prophet shall die.'



5. Introduction to the Prophets **C.** Test of the Prophets 3) Leads Hearers to God (not Away) **Deuteronomy 13:1–3** If a prophet or a dreamer of dreams arises among you and gives you a sign or a wonder, and the sign or wonder that he tells you comes to pass, and if he says, 'Let us go after other gods,' which you

Introduction to the Prophets **C.** Test of the Prophets 3) Leads Hearers to God (not Away) **Deuteronomy 13:1–3** have not known, 'and let us serve them,' you shall not listen to the words of that prophet or that dreamer of dreams. For the LORD your God is testing you, to know whether you love the LORD ou your God with all your heart and with all your soul. 5. Introduction to the Prophets **C.** Test of the Prophets 4) Must Have Integrity Micah 3:5, 7 Thus says the LORD concerning the prophets who lead my people astray, who cry "Peace" when they have something to eat, but declare war against him who puts nothing into their mouths. ... the seer su shall be disgraced... and put to shame...

5. Introduction to the Prophets **D.** Speaking vs. Writing Prophets Romans 15:4 For whatever was written in former days was written for our instruction, that through endurance and through the encouragement of the Scriptures we might have hope.



5. Introduction to the Prophets **D.** Speaking vs. Writing Prophets 2 Timothy 3:16–17 All Scripture is breathed out by God and profitable for teaching, for reproof, for correction, and for training in righteousness, that the man of God may be complete, equipped for every good work.
